A NOTE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

I was speaking with a woman who grew up in an orphanage in the mid 1900s. She recently became a grandmother and was assisting her daughter with a photo album for her new grandchild. Her daughter wanted photographs of her to include in the child's memory book but, unfortunately, having grown up in an orphanage most of her life, she had no childhood photos of herself.

Please remember that youths placed in your home may have little memory of their younger years and many times few to no pictures to remind them of their past. It is very important for resource families to help children create and update photo albums or memory books whether the children are placed on a short-term foster care or long- term adoptive basis. These memories are irreplaceable.

MARYLAND ADOPTION OFFICE SECURES FUNDING FOR SUPPORT GROUPS

Adoptive families have a new resource for support and information, as the result of a package of grants awarded to Diakon Adoption Services in Maryland.

Awarded by the state Department of Human Resources, the grants fund adoption support groups in 10 Maryland counties and the City of Baltimore. Funding began in April 2007 and runs for two years.

Diakon partnered with congregations—10 Lutheran and one Baptist—

in each of the 11 jurisdictions to serve as support-group sites. The meetings are open to any adoptive family, not only those who have adopted through Diakon. Those who want to learn more about adoption or who are involved in foster care also may attend. Free childcare is provided.

The groups focus on topics of interest to adoptive families, says Ramona Hoyle, director of Diakon Adoption Services in Maryland, including attachment issues, positive

discipline techniques, child development, educational resources for the child with special needs, and loyalty and the birth family. Some topics feature guest speakers.

The grants include a requirement for community outreach, with one event in each area in November to celebrate National Adoption Month, and a second awareness event to be held during any other month. In May, adoption staff took part in Family Day, a community fair at Ravenwood Lutheran Village, a Diakon Lutheran Senior Living Community in Hagerstown.

"We were already serving parts of Maryland," Hoyle says, "and these grants extend Diakon's service in counties where we previously had no presence, expanding our ministry."

Elisa Esh, director, recruitment and family development, remembers him fondly. "When we began getting support for the event this year, Billy was one of the first drivers we spoke to. He basically told us that he was working on limited funds [but] that he would be more than happy to feature a child waiting for adoption decal on his car."

As the event drew closer and the response from children around Pennsylvania to be a part of the event and featured on the cars grew

That night Billy raced his slow engine but 10,000 people saw the child featured on his car. Billy Kimmel put himself behind the mission of making sure that every child finds a family. He was a fine young man, racer, and friend of Diakon Adoption & Foster Care. He will be missed.

TIPS AND TRICKS TO PARENTING

- Modify your vocabulary to match what your child understands.

 Parents who use vocabulary beyond their child's understanding often receive blank stares and become frustrated when a child repeats the behaviors.
- Increase your child's vocabulary about his or her feelings. There is more diversity to human emotions than feeling either good and happy or bad and sad. Teach your children other "feeling words," such as feeling proud, satisfied, content or discouraged, embarrassed, or disappointed. This can be tremendously beneficial with helping children feel confident they can be understood and express themselves.
- Remember your child's attention span when explaining, correcting, or simply conversing. If a child's attention appears to be wondering, modify your communication style to ensure the child receives the message and simply isn't enduring a lecture.
- Younger teenagers tend to perceive the world concretely and are only beginning to learn more abstract thinking. Gradually help teens recognize the variety that life can offer and that ambiguity or uncertainty can be okay.
- Keep in mind gender differences when parenting. This is becoming an increasingly popular field of study and is demonstrating that gender differences exist and need to be accounted for when parenting. One example is that girls tend to learn language skills earlier whereas boys tend to acquire visual skills and recognize spatial differences at an earlier age. As a result, boys may need more time to conceptualize their thoughts and express themselves when answering a question, and girls may need additional practice when using motor skills at an early age.
