

WITH LOVE, FOSTER KIDS GROW UP TO BE 'AMAZING'

he sound of a crying baby can be one of the most difficult things to hear, even for a brief time. But imagine hearing a baby cry for almost an entire day. Chris and Dorothy Botzum discovered what that was like when they welcomed a 10-day-old, drugaddicted, foster child into their home.

"We had to put hallucinogenic drugs in her baby bottle and when we weaned her, she cried for 22 hours straight," says Dorothy Botzum. "We got her through."

Dorothy and her husband, Chris, did more than get the child through; they've seen her, plus six other children, grow up to become "amazing."

Without the love and compassion of foster families such as the Botzums, many children in the system might never experience a loving, happy home.

"Foster care requires special people. The Botzums have a natural ability to cherish each child who comes into their home," says Kathy Roach, director of the Northeastern Pennsylvania office of Diakon Adoption & Foster Care.

Ironically, the Botzums didn't start out to become foster parents. They contacted Diakon as well as several other agencies, intending to adopt—not foster parent—a child.

"Most of the agencies said, 'We have this child and this is how much it will cost you to adopt," says Dorothy. "When a Diakon person came to speak to us, we were so amazed. They said, 'We have a lot of children who need someone like you."

That was all they needed to hear—they became foster parents soon thereafter.

Diakon Adoption & Foster Care has helped thousands of children and youths of all ages gain permanency with loving adoptive and foster families. By offering a full range of adoption, foster-to-adopt, and foster care services, Diakon works to bring permanency to the lives of waiting children.

More than 20,000 children are currently in the foster care system in Pennsylvania, says Roach, so the need for families remains as great as ever.

The Botzums have enjoyed their experience with Diakon and serve as advocates for foster care whenever they have the opportunity.



MORE YOUTHS AND FAMILIES SERVED IN 2009; YEAR ENDS ON POSITIVE NOTE

We ended 2009 on a positive note, considering the tentative market and financial outlook of the nation. We were able to serve more youths and families while also minimizing the subsidy needed for program operations. Although significant dollars were still required to maintain operations and offset the budgeted program deficit, we remained at a deficit of less

than \$500,000. This is significantly better than the \$900,000 loss incurred in 2008.

Annual comparison:

- Referred 631 SWAN units of service in 2009, significantly higher than the 464 units referred in 2008.
- Completed 590 SWAN units of service in 2009, compared to 397 in 2008.
- There were 73 adoption finalizations in 2009, higher than the 62 that occurred in 2008.
- While foster care referrals across sites dropped by more than 30% last year, in 2009 we placed 112 children into foster care, higher than the 96 children in 2008.
- The number of discharges from out-of-home foster care was a little lower in 2009 than 2008, with 93 children compared to 104, respectively.
- The average daily population in 2008 was approximately 123 youths in foster children, dropping to 114 in 2009.
- The length of stay in foster care remained about the same as the prior year, with about 72% of the youths in foster care less than 24 months and more than 50% in care less than 12 months.
- Similar to 2008, more than 70% of the youths discharged from our foster care program had a positive permanency disposition, either returning home, to a relative's care, or being adopted.

Accomplishments:

- Successfully implemented the Older Child Matching Initiative (OCMI) grant
 program, well exceeding the deliverables set within the program. More
 older youths, at risk of aging out of the foster care system without a
 permanent family resource, were matched with prospective families than
 expected.
- Awarded for the third year in a row two Child-Specific Recruitment Grants through Wendy's Wonderful Kids - Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption.
 The grants enable us to search for and identify an adoptive family resource for older youths with special needs.
- We held several successful events across the state, creating more awareness of the need for resource families and family connections for youths in the foster care system.

Thanks to the hard work of our staff and the flexibility and dedication of our families, we were able to achieve great things in 2009. We're looking forward to a great 2010 as well.

Volunteers needed to mentor older children

ne issue with which the child welfare system struggles is the "aging out" of youths. This situation refers to teens who have been in foster placement and do not have a permanent family resource when they leave foster care, either at the age of 18 or when they finish their formal education.


These youths are among those who have the highest school dropout rates, future homelessness, and criminal system involvement. The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is developing services to help these youths make the "connections" that can help prevent such problems.

One new service involves finding mentors for these youth. Diakon Adoption & Foster Care is looking for adults who are interested in volunteering their time to be a connection for young people. Mentoring is one of the most significant ways an individual can affect the life of a young person. No special skills are needed, just the willingness to care about and spend time with someone who needs you.

The type of connection

required can vary greatly.

Some youths are looking for a home where they can stay during breaks from college. Others are looking for a relationship with someone they can call when they need some support. Yet others are looking for a mentor who might have them over for dinner once a month, in a "Big Brother/Big Sister" capacity. The possibilities are endless.

New legislation affects adoption and foster care

Recently passed legislation called Fostering Connections is designed to help children remain with their birth families and prevent them from entering the foster care system. As a result, services are being targeted toward "at-risk" families to help prevent issues of abuse and neglect, which can lead to placement. In addition, Fostering Connections is designed to help keep siblings together in their same school and with relatives if placement is needed.

While these services are designed to prevent placements, the need for foster and adoptive families continues to be high. Children placed with foster families, however, may stay for shorter periods as counties search for "fit and willing" kin able to raise these children until they are either reunified with their birth family or until the children become legally free for adoption.

There are many children in Pennsylvania who are currently legally free for adoption and who have no family or adoptive resources. Many of these children are over age 10 and/or may have behavioral or emotional challenges that require special parenting and interventions to help them adjust to their new families. In addition, there continues to be a great need for families to foster and adopt teens, and to accept larger sibling groups. ADOPTION TAX CREDIT EXPANDED, EXTENDED

On March 23, President Barack Obama signed into law the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. Prior to this law, the adoption tax credit was set to expire Dec. 31, 2010. Section 10909 of this bill addresses the adoption tax credit in the following ways:

- The amount has been increased by \$1,000, bringing the amount to \$13,170 for tax year 2010.
- The credit was made refundable for all types of adoptions, allowing families with small tax liabilities to better access the credit (adoptions finalized in 2010 and 2011).
- The credit will be extended through Dec. 31, 2011.

THE PORCH LIGHT PROJECT: FOREVER FAMILY FOR EVERY CHILD

It is commonly known, even to those outside of child welfare, that when children are adopted from Pennsylvania's foster care system their birth relatives no longer have any legal standing, and children have no guarantee of ever seeing birth relatives again. Why not change this?

Pennsylvania Partnerships for Children (PPC), a statewide independent, non-partisan child advocacy organization began a child welfare public policy initiative: The Porch Light Project: Forever Family for Every Child nearly two years ago. The effort is in collaboration with Casey Family Programs, the largest foundation committed to safely reducing the number of children in foster care. The Porch Light Project has set a child welfare public policy reform agenda to promote permanency; and establishing voluntary and enforceable postadoption contact agreements by amending the state's Adoption Act is a top legislative priority in 2010.

Even though our state has a "closed" adoption process many of us can point to examples when post-adoption contact between adoptive families and birth relatives continues informally. These informal post-adoption contact arrangements can offer numerous life-long benefits to children when the relationships assure child safety and well-being—and formalizing these efforts could benefit many more children in our Commonwealth.

What if we could help more youth in foster care, who have torn family loyalties, consider being adopted instead of them remaining in foster care with a non-permanency goal of APPLA? What if Pennsylvania had a more cooperative adoption process?

For these and other good reasons PPC is working to advance legislation that would allow for voluntary and enforceable post adoption-contact agreements for children being adopted from foster care.

This public policy change would facilitate the adoption process being more cooperative, efficient, and better for children.

Twenty-three states have already established policies that allow for voluntary post-adoption contact agreements. These voluntary agreements are made between adoptive and birth families, but are then made formal by the courts at the time of the adoption finalization. These agreements are enforceable, similar to a visitation agreement that would be part of a custody order.
