Looking back on four decades of service

It has been 43 years since I stepped onto the campus of The Lutheran Home at Topton. I didn't know at the time that my professional career would both begin and end here.

I will be retiring in April.

I have had a wonderful and fulfilling career with this organization and I am so proud of all we have been able to accomplish. While I am saddened to leave the incredible Diakon Adoption & Foster Care team, the time has come for me to experience the next phase of my journey in life.

I look forward to checking items off my "bucket list," hoping to travel and spend more time with my family.

When it came time for high-school graduation, I was not sure about the career path I would select. I had great interest in art and architecture, but was drawn to social work. While growing up, my parents were both very active in the community either volunteering or serving on committees or as board members. I believe that influenced me to study social welfare at Kutztown University.

While at Kutztown, I heard about a local residential facility for youths at The Lutheran Home at Topton. I was encouraged by a professor to apply for a position at the Home to care for children while the house parents were off duty. This was an eye-opening experience for me. I had never worked with youths having behavioral and/or mental health issues.

After completing my degree, I accepted a case manager position working with the same youths on the Topton campus and in later years worked with youths in group homes and in foster care.

My passion for the work really took hold when program leadership asked me to help with the development of an

adoption program. It was not long until the program was up and running. We were training families, completing home studies, placing children via pregnancy services, foster care and international programs. From then on, the programs expanded and grew.

The creation of what is now known as Pennsylvania's Statewide Adoption & Permanency Network—typically called SWAN—occurred and we were one of the first affiliates to participate.

In 1984, I left Diakon to begin my family, also working for another organization during this period. I returned in the fall of 1987.

Since returning, I have held several leadership roles. In 2000, Lutheran Services Northeast, which then incorporated The Lutheran Home at Topton, affiliated (and later merged) with Tressler Lutheran Services, based in the Harrisburg region. As a result of the affiliation, I began supervising the Tressler adoption program in York.

I found a wonderful group of people there and over time we formed a solid team. I learned a lot about interstate adoptive placements and new ways to conduct trainings while in York. I also learned a lot about working from your car on my trips back and forth to York!

More changes occurred as our programs grew and, in November 2015, I was promoted to the executive director position.

One of the first tasks at that time was the creation of a single adoption and foster care team working out of the Mechanicsburg and York offices. That group is now called our Capital team and is thriving.

Overall, Diakon Adoption & Foster Care now consists of more than 90 staff members at all our locations and I am so proud of the group and all the services we provide to children, youths and families.

In this, my final column in *Family Connections*, I want to thank all of you, our foster and adoptive families, for the loving care and support you provide the children and youths in your homes.

You all do amazing work!

The child welfare system is not always the easiest to navigate, but I am humbled by your perseverance.

Diakon Adoption & Foster Care earns two awards

The year 2020 will not be remembered fondly in light of the COVID-19 pandemic and the way it turned many aspects of life upside-down.

But there have been points of light in this tumultuous year, including two awards earned by Diakon Adoption & Foster Care.

“Diakon Adoption & Foster Care continued to have a great year despite the pandemic and all the flexibility that required,” says Joyce Riche, M.A., director of permanency services for Eastern Pennsylvania. “We were fortunate to be recognized for our hard work with two very special awards.”

Riche says Pennsylvania’s annual Statewide Adoption & Permanency Network statewide meeting was to be held in June, but became a virtual meeting. Awards are given at this event.

“In 2020, Patricia Menow, supervisor of the Topton office’s foster care program, and Erin Oshansky, permanency case manager in our Topton office, along with Lauren Howard, a Berks County Children and Youth caseworker, and Dr. Alison Hill, of Berks Counseling

Associates were awarded the Permanency Teamwork Award for their work with a youth with an extensive trauma history,” Riche says.

The SWAN Permanency Teamwork Award is presented to a team that exemplifies a collaborative effort that promotes permanency for children with special needs.

“A second, national award was presented to one of our Diakon programs, again at a virtual event, in November 2020,” Riche says. The Administration for Children and Families, part of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, recognized Pennsylvania’s Older Child Matching Initiative with a 2020 Adoption Excellence Award. OCMI is a program of the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services’ SWAN.

Riche says DHS first approved OCMI in 2008 and awarded the contract to Diakon Adoption & Foster Care with partners from Bethanna, Project STAR at The Children’s Institute and Family Pathways, which continue to be partners.

Sibling training sets us apart

One thing that sets Diakon Adoption & Foster Care apart is our sibling training.

This evidence-based curriculum helps birth and adopted children already in a resource family prepare for the addition of a foster or adoptive sibling or sibling group in their home, family and life.

Sibling trainings were on hold for most of 2020 because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

In the Capital region, trainers adapted the curriculum to an online format, which will be offered for the first time March 13, with additional dates to be announced.

The primary objectives and components of the in-person curriculum remain the same, including helping children understand:

- Who youths in the child welfare system are
- Grief and loss
- Empathy
- Understanding family roles and dynamics
- Coping with change.

Incentives for Family Referral

One of the toughest parts of our job occurs when we cannot respond to the immediate need to place a child—because no family is available for that situation.

We need **more great families like yours** to meet the pressing needs of children and youths.

In fact, you can help us to do just that. And help yourself in the process.

Diakon Adoption & Foster Care is now providing a stipend to Diakon resource families for each family you help to recruit who completes various stages of the approval and placement processes.

Here is the incentive-payment schedule:

- * **Identified family completes training:** \$ 50
- * **Family approved/licensed:** \$100
- * **Family accepts placement:** \$100
- * **Family accepts placement of a teen (age 13 or older) or sibling group:** \$150

For you to be eligible for the full amount of \$250 - \$300, the licensed home must accept a placement through one of our programs and the child must remain in the home for at least 30 days.

So that you receive credit, please ask the family calling or emailing us to identify you as their referral source.

As a Diakon family, you are one of our most-critical resources. You have made a huge difference in the lives of waiting children and youths.

Now, you can make an even greater difference by helping us to find even more families like yours!

Cayden Roth, 12, launches fundraiser for Diakon Adoption & Foster Care, scholarship fund

Cayden Roth, 12, recently launched a fundraising event for Diakon Adoption & Foster Care and the Diakon Scholarship Fund.

Cayden was placed with his forever family, Lori and Stephen Roth, through Diakon’s foster care program at the age of 13 months, and his adoption was finalized in April 2011. “Cayden has a history of fundraising for our program, and donating other supplies to our children in care,” says Joyce Riche, M.A., director of permanency services.

In commemoration of the 10-year anniversary of his adoption finalization, Cayden had wanted to donate some of his own money to Diakon. “He and his mom talked about that being a good idea, but if he invested some of his own money, he could probably make enough money to donate even more. So he took \$250 and bought 25 signs, hoping to double his investment. He sold all 25, for a total of \$500 within a half-hour of his initial Facebook post, which is where he advertised them. He then bought 100 more to sell.”

Overall, he raised more than \$1,700 to benefit both Diakon Adoption & Foster Care and the Diakon Youth Scholarship Fund.

“Plus, Cayden is doing the delivery and installation of the signs himself!” Riche says.

Since its inception, OCMI has helped more than 200 older youths find permanency. The initiative targets children older than 10, who are legally free for adoption and have complex medical/mental health needs or comprise a large sibling group. At this time, 66 Pennsylvania counties make referrals to OCMI.

Karen Knodel, manager of permanency services and grants for Diakon Adoption & Foster Care, accepted the award at a virtual ceremony Nov. 17. In addition to the presentation of the awards, the celebration highlighted a national adoption recruitment campaign and launched the newest public service announcement that encourages the adoption of older youths from foster care.

“Although this award names OCMI leadership and recruiters, it is made possible through the efforts of everyone involved in making permanency happen for these older youth,” Riche says. “We want to congratulate everyone. Keep up the great work that recognizes that all children, regardless of age or disability, can achieve permanency.”

Diakon offers foster care for teens

One way Diakon Adoption & Foster Care serves older youths in foster care is through the Steps to Independence program and training provided to participating families.

The program was approved a year and a half ago and Diakon continues to seek families to provide homes for teens.

“On average, 50 percent of our foster care referrals on a monthly basis are for teenagers in need of loving families, and we do not have enough homes for teens,” says Casandra Dry, M.A., manager of recruitment.

The program serves youths 12 to 21 who may have emotional and behavioral needs that require additional psychiatric services, including medication, therapy and drug and alcohol interventions to support the maintenance of their placement in a resource home. It also provides additional support to families and youths through the Family Support Specialist and teen support groups.

Dry says to best serve the youths, resource families are required to complete components of Critical On-Going Resource Family Education—typically called CORE—Teen. The CORE Teen classroom training provides families with an intermediate level of learning and understanding of the root causes of behaviors and how to address the needs behind a child’s behavior.

“They will learn the impact of trauma on youths in foster care and how trauma can affect the cognitive and emotional

development of each child. Parents will learn innovative parenting techniques to effectively parent teens, developing and sustaining healthy relationships with a teen, managing and understanding youths’ challenging behaviors and personal self-care,” Dry explains.

“This training curriculum provides resource families with ongoing skills development needed to understand and promote committed, continual relationships with youths in their care. Training is held in a cohort format with opportunities for open discussions and building supportive relationships with other resource parents.”

Diakon is in the process of offering one series with plans for an additional two series this year.

Diakon continues to seek resource families willing to provide a home to these older youths and adolescents.

“We are fully committed to both preparing families for this challenge and providing on-going support throughout the placement,” says Dry.

The CORE Teen Classroom training is a seven-session series, with some sessions combined into one training day. The next available series will be hosted virtually through ZOOM on the following dates and times:

All trainings must be taken to be issued a certificate of completion.

REMEMBER:

CORE is also available for families who have already adopted or taken permanent legal custody of a youth. Because of SWAN Post-Permanency funding, families would not be charged for this training.

Diakon Adoption & Foster Care is offering a new service: the Intersections Child Preparation Group for older youths.


Intersections is a Statewide Adoption & Permanency Network-approved group that serves young people at the intersection of being in the child welfare system while also experiencing life as part of the LGBTQ+ community.

The program is designed to:

- Provide a welcoming place for LGBTQ+ youths
- Create positive connections
- Support teens in finding their voice
- Help youths to experience a healthy community.

Employing the tenets of the "3-5-7 Model" that is integral to the child-preparation unit, Intersections staff facilitators guide youths through a combination of group and individual sessions that help them reach achieve goals by answering such questions as ...

- Who am I?
- What has happened?
- Where am I going?



- Who will help me get there?
- How will I know when I belong?

Participants are supported in exploring these vital questions while also experiencing the opportunity to connect with others in a safe, positive and empowering environment.

Because of COVID-19, the group is being held virtually and can therefore support youths across the state.
