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Ensuring others have 'family privileges'

During the holiday season, most of us had "family privilege." By "family privilege," I am referring to a family, no matter what the composition, whether by birth, adoption, life experiences, friendships, or connections. That privilege is invaluable to our happiness, support systems, and success in life. I recently attended a 70th birthday party for my father and looking across the room of more than 100 attendees and lifelong "supports"

for my father, I thought of the children in foster care without an identified adoptive family or who are at risk of aging out of the foster care system at the age of 18 with no family to call their own.

Recently, however, Pennsylvania Gov. Tom Corbett proposed a budget to implement fully the federal Fostering Connections to Success and Increasing Adoptions Act of 2008. This proposal provides Pennsylvania with incentives to improve outcomes for foster youth and promote adoption and legal guardianship. Currently, adoptive and permanent legal guardianship families can receive adoption subsidy only until their children reach the age of 18. Youths in foster care can receive foster care services only until 18 unless they meet certain educational or treatment criteria.

The governor's proposed changes would extend adoption and guardianship subsidies to the age of 21, the same agelimit that exists for foster care support, a change that would encourage permanent placements and improve educational and long-term outcomes for youths and children in the child welfare system. Eliminating the current financial disincentive to permanency by extending subsidy until youths turn 21 will help more young people secure a "forever family" through permanency options. The proposal would also allow more youths between ages 18 and 21 to benefit from the support of a foster family in cases in which adoption or legal guardianship might not be an option.

These changes would place significantly less financial stress on Diakon resource families and the youths they have committed to love and support during these financially challenging times. It also would allow foster families to continue to receive support for youths for whom adoption is not an option. Further, our state will save an estimated \$4.5 million in FY 12-13 because of a reduction in foster care placements as a result of additional adoptions related to the extended subsidy. Millions of dollars in additional federal support for the new initiatives also is expected.

Overall, changes to current practices will most benefit the children and youths we serve and their families. This additional support, of course, is of the utmost importance in complementing the important work our foster and adoptive families do each day as they care for children and youths.

In further thinking of support for our foster children during the holiday season, I was reminded that, "It takes a village to raise a child!"

Again this year, multiple organizations and individuals chose to provide Christmas joy to children in our foster care through donations of toys, clothing, school supplies, gift cards, and multiple other items. These gifts to vulnerable children made it very clear that not only did their safe, stable, and loving foster and adoptive families care for them, but also that a community is there to make them feel special and like children again—despite their often traumatic pasts.

We look forward to our continued work with resource families, county colleagues, community supporters and, of course, the children and youths we serve in 2012. The more support we as a community can offer our resource families and children, the better.

Our greatest hope, after all, is that the children and youths served by Diakon Adoption & Foster Care will have the "family privilege" they deserve and many birthdays and holidays with an endless number of family and friends to wish them well.

Wilderness Challenge offers self-reflection, growth

During the coldest months of the year, most people spend as much time as possible indoors, staying warm. For a small group of young men in the 30-Day Wilderness Challenge Program, however, that time is spent enduring all that Mother Nature throws at them as they journey along the Appalachian Trail, exploring new ways to cope with the intrinsic difficulties of being a teenager.

Far removed from cell phones, computers, and other distractions of modern living, the boys spend their first week near the Diakon Wilderness Center's campus, focusing their attention on mastering the vital wilderness skills it takes to live comfortably in adverse conditions. They become experts at setting up shelters, building campfires, and cooking foods that won't be found on a McDonald's menu. Through each of these activities, ample opportunities arise to demonstrate the value of building on communication skills, team work, and leadership.

Anthony Brau, program manager of the 30-day program, has been working with these groups for the past five

years. "Many of these boys have never been exposed to the intricacies of what it takes be a positive contributor in a group setting. It takes good communication and tolerance and patience to work through some pretty strong differences of opinion."

After their basic wilderness skills are honed, the boys begin their expedition along the Appalachian Trail. Each day, by actively engaging in the planned activities of hiking, rock climbing, snowshoeing, and daily chores, a high level of trust and camaraderie is developed among the group members and the staff.

"As the instructors and students share in such intense experiences, strong relationships can be built that assist in fostering meaningful, self-reflective discussions that can greatly benefit everyone involved, including the staff," says Brau. A time is set aside each day for "main topics," engaging discussions that address issues with which teens often struggle, such as decision-making, conflict resolution, drug and alcohol

use, leadership development, and other life skills.

One of the more effective elements of the wilderness challenge comes midway through the program, when each student participates in a 72-hour solo experience. Placed in his own private campsite, the student uses the time to reflect and write journal entries on his own experiences. With the help of instructors, students begin to develop individual plans they can implement in their personal lives to help build successes.

Derek Hofeldt, the course's lead instructor, believes in the value of the experience. "Solos' are powerful experiences. They allow students to take a break from being in the group and focus more on themselves and their own, unique challenges. It also gives a chance for us, as instructors, to visit with the students away from the influences of their peers."

After completing the solo experience the group reunites, often refreshed, ready to take on the challenge of the

The Vietnamese Adoptees Reunion invites first-generation Vietnamese adoptees to spend a weekend in the Colorado Rockies, Aug. 31 to Sept. 3, 2012. The event will be a gathering of Vietnamese adoptees who left Vietnam from 1960 through 1975; at the event they will be able to meet other adoptees, family members, former caregivers, adoption agencies, and Vietnam Vets, as well as reflect on the past, celebrate the present, and gain insights from other adoptees who have shared similar experiences.

In April to May of 1975, Diakon Adoption & Foster Care (at that time known as Tressler Adoption Services) became part of the historical rescue of orphans living in orphanages in war-torn Vietnam; the evacuation of those children became known as Operation Babylift. As Saigon began to fall and U.S. occupation in Vietnam drew to a

close, it became apparent that children in need of adoptive homes were in imminent need of evacuation from the country.


Tressler Lutheran Services worked with Holt International and Betty Tisdale, leader of the rescue, to bring more than 200 children to the United States for placement with adoptive families. In less than six weeks, Tressler placed 219 children with adoptive families in Pennsylvania and across the nation in collaboration with other adoption agencies.

This courageous venture has been depicted in a Lifetime movie and discussed in the book, "Chicken Soup for the Adopted Soul."

Diakon continues participation in Wendy's Wonderful Kids program

For the sixth year in a row, Diakon Adoption & Foster Care is participating in the Wendy's Wonderful Kids program.

In late December, Diakon received a 2012 Wendy's Wonderful Kids grant of \$67,500 from the Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption.

"We are delighted to be able to continue to participate in this wonderful program," says Elisa Esh, executive director of Diakon Adoption & Foster Care. "The program has been described as the heart and soul of the Dave Thomas Foundation. Dave Thomas, founder of Wendy's, held to the simple belief that every child deserves a permanent home and loving family. He made it his life's mission to encourage others to take responsibility for these children and to be a loud voice for foster-care adoption."

Throughout 2011, Diakon Adoption & Foster Care's Mechanicsburg-based Wendy's Wonderful Kids site succeeded in facilitating 10 matches and one adoption finalization. In late December, there were 10 additional children in pre-adoptive placements, with those placements scheduled to finalize through adoption early in 2012.

The Wendy's Wonderful Kids program began in 2006 with only six operating sites in the U.S. During the last six

"final expedition." During this last phase of the program, instructors step back from directing the students and allow them to apply what they have learned. The students plan every detail of the seven-day expedition, holding one another accountable for behaviors that detract from the success of the group. This situation encourages each participant to practice skills worked on throughout the first half of the program and prepare to continue using them when returning home.

"The wilderness challenge program is like nothing else in the state of Pennsylvania," Hofeldt adds. "The woods provide a unique vehicle to capture the attention of today's distracted teenagers, allowing us to teach life skills that easily translate into healthy living—not to mention that the kids seem to appreciate what they have back home when they wake up to a fresh layer of snow on the ground!"

One parent of a former student agrees, having written that "[Our son] is doing well since coming home. He definitely is more pleasant and helpful. He is even taking more responsibility both for what needs to get done and when he does something wrong."

years the program has expanded to include 122 operating sites covering all 50 states and several Canadian provinces and territories.

The foundation awards grants to carefully selected public and private agencies to hire adoption professionals who implement intensive, child-focused recruitment strategies for children who have been waiting the longest for a permanent family and who, typically, have histories of abandonment, abuse, neglect, and multiple placements.

The Wendy's Wonderful Kids program focuses on transitioning these children from foster homes, group homes, or residential treatment facilities to permanent homes by searching the children's inner circle of family and other important individuals and moving outward to the local surrounding community in which they live. The program empowers children by involving them as much as possible in the recruitment process and providing an avenue for them to voice their needs, wants, and concerns.

Diakon Adoption & Foster Care has been serving children in need since the early 1970s; it has offices in Mechanicsburg, York, and Topton, Pa.

Respite services provide needed 'break' for families

Diakon Adoption & Foster Care provides post-placement services to families who live in Pennsylvania and are caring for children under 18 through adoption, kinship, and permanent legal custodianship. These services include case advocacy, support group, and respite.

Respite services are offered to a child in a family identified by a SWAN (Statewide Adoption & Permanency Network) provider. The service is provided as a means to give the family a "break," so that they can continue to parent their child to the best of their ability.

Respite services are available for up to 48 hours per month and may be provided for a short time (4 to 8 hours), overnight (up to 24 hours), or for a weekend (up to 48 hours) depending on the needs of the family. Individuals or families providing respite are financially compensated for their time.

This service has proven to be crucial for some families providing permanency to children with special needs. Respite families come in all shapes and sizes and all have a desire to help others.
