Recently we all proudly congregated in Harrisburg to support Chris Chilton in the Grand Review, during which he was dressed in authentic Civil War attire and was marching with other volunteers from across the East Coast as a commemoration of the November 1865 event of the same name organized by the women of Harrisburg to honor the United States Colored Troops (U.S.C.T.) from 25 states who were not permitted to participate in the Grand...

Answering His call ...

On August 1st, 2010, I was baptized. On that day, I made a public statement of my faith. It was the happiest day of my life, and I will never forget it as long as I live. But let me also tell you now that the days that followed were far from rainbows and butterflies, but I've strived to remain consistent with my conviction to serve others. Even before my baptism, I had felt called to service. My trip to Haiti in December opened my eyes to what is breaking God's heart. Therefore, I have spent the last four months helping others as much as I can. I say "I," but in reality, it's Flight that has been reaching out a helping hand to so many people over the last four months.

We have spent time volunteering for Pine Grove Furnace State Park, the Hudson River Sloop Clearwater (sailing the Hudson River and teaching third and fourth graders about the environment), and for the American Red Cross. Rob and I have recently joined the local Red Cross Disaster Relief Team so that we can be there to help when disaster strikes. We all spent a Flight weekend going through the proper trainings and certifications, and just last week we received a call around midnight about a house fire in Cumberland County. The house was destroyed – the family of five that was living there had lost everything. The family members' health was not affected by the fire, but their home was gone. We showed up to help with getting the family into a hotel for a couple nights and giving them funds for clothes and food. It's nice to go on sailing trips to teach children about a river, and help with landscaping at a local park, but the real service takes place when a hand is reached out to those who have nothing.

In October, Rob, Mat, and I returned to Haiti for a week to scout out what future missions trips could help with there. The children at all the orphanages were all okay, but several of them had lost their buildings due to the earthquake. Traveling down the streets of Port-Au-Prince, we saw many collapsed buildings. Many of them still have skeletons from people that were trapped in the rubble and were never rescued. Although we can't just go down there with bricks and mortar and rebuild the orphanages in a week or bring the needed tools to break up all the rubble, we could visit the orphanages and play games with the kids. We traveled to several orphanages and spent time playing with the kids and coming up with plans of how we



can help the people who were affected by the quake. I have traveled extensively, but when I get off the plane in Haiti, I feel God's presence more so than anywhere else in the world.

Needless to say, Rob and I will be returning to Haiti for years to come. At this moment, we are preparing for our trip the day after Christmas. We have talked with Girl Scouts and various other organizations about helping with our preparation by donating clothes, toys, toothbrushes, soap, etc. to the children in need. In the near future, we will be moving bunk beds from the Diakon Wilderness Center into containers to be shipped to Haiti so that the children at some of the orphanages will no longer have to sleep on the floor. It's cool to see how sacrificing our time to help others has rendered such a fruitful outcome. But rest assured, we won't stop helping others any time soon because...*That's how we roll!*
