The great writer Stephen Chbosky once said "*Things change…life doesn't stop for anybody.*" The Flight Program is in the midst of life rolling on for our participants and staff, and that has lead to lots of change. The most significant one of those changes is the change in leadership of the program. After nearly four years at the helm, Rob Kivlan stepped down from his role as Flight Manager in April 2013 and took a new role as a Development Officer with Diakon. Rob was the backbone of Flight and he will always be the foundation that



formed the program through its early years and built it into *Rob with Jean Rony & Ricka in Jacmel, Haiti* what it is today. Dozens of young men were touched by his work with them and they are all better young men for it.

With Rob's departure, I have taken over the role of Flight Program Manager. For those who have never met me before, my name is Matt Reichard and I have been the Flight Program Assistant since February of 2010. For a little background, I am married to Julie and we have three kids, Logan (age 9), Austin (age 5) and Madison (age 4). You

have likely seen them in past newsletters, especially Logan, who tags along to many of our Flight events. I have an educational background in Theology and Counseling and an extensive background in ministry. Much like Rob, I am also heavily involved in ministry in Haiti. In fact, I met

Rob when he traveled with my ministry to Haiti in 2010. My wife and I, along with friends from Canada, have founded three orphanages and a pediatric clinic in Haiti.

During my time with Flight I have been honored to work with most of the young men who have been a part of the program. I have been blessed by not only walking with them as they made choices and decisions that helped them to become who they wanted to be, but also in the failures and struggles along the way. It sounds weird to have been blessed by struggles, but it is in those struggles and failures that each young man has had their biggest moments of growth. Get knocked down, get right back up. The true measure of a winner, of a champion, is not how many times you get knocked down, it is the ability to get right back up and keep on going. Resilience is what separates the men from the boys.



I recently took a small plane ride over Haiti. From that high, all of the chaos was gone, everything seemed okay. No poverty, no disease, no orphans; from that high up, you couldn't see any of that. From a few thousand feet it was just a bunch of beautiful mountains. As the new leader of this program, it is my goal to work with each one of our young men right where they are, right in the place in their lives that they need support the most; to not just look at them from a distance and see only the big things, but to walk alongside of them in brotherhood and see them for who they really are. As a program, we want to not just help guys get into school or get a job (the big things) but also learn to control their emotions, contribute to their community and have healthy relationships. A well-rounded man is not only one who is educated and employed, but also one who

shows leadership and earns respect not just because of the big things, but because they are honorable in the little things too.

It is my hope that, as you support each one of them, their stories will inspire you and show you that, with young men like these, our futures is in good hands. "My experience on my first mission trip to the Dominican Republic was one of the most exhilarating experiences in my life. First, to be called by Christ to serve on that capacity in another country was a humbling experience because I daily wrestle with my sinful heart. That was a true display of grace. Next, to see another culture and experience it firsthand helped me to grow as person in Christ in serving and preaching the Gospel.

When we did an outreach concert in the worst part of Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, it was intimidating because I simply didn't know how to under-



stand or speak Spanish fluently. As the night went on and I was able to preach Gospel through music alongside some of the country's biggest Christian Hip-Hop artists, it was humbling and a great experience. When



we visited the orphanage, it was the best time to spend time with kids and play games with them. Also, we helped the missionaries for two days in construction to build their discipleship center. We, as a team, we hosted two Vacation bible schools for the children in the D.R., teaching the bible and preaching the Gospel. We literally saw and witnessed young kids come to Christ in the Vacation bible schools. Overall, it was a great and humbling experience to serve and grow in Christ."

We're not afraid to cry in front of each other. We're not afraid to ask for help. We dropped that front. Fridays and Saturdays are now about positive people, places, and things. We're on the move, in and out of state, going to new events, helping wherever there is a need, meeting new people, hiking new trails, and always... telling our stories.

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
